MULTI-AGENCY PROCESSES

COMMISSION POWERS & DUTIES

- La. R.S. 38, §3097.4 Water Resources Commission's powers and responsibilities regarding Surface Water Resources of the State:
- Evaluate the state's surface water resources including current and projected demands,
- inventory the state's surface water supplies,
- identify technical research and previously developed information on surface water,
- identify potential future deficit areas,
- study alternatives to surface water use including treatment, transmission systems, and reclamation, and
- investigate incentives for conservation and the use of alternative technologies, including public education and conservation programs.

NEW LEGISLATION

Act 285 by Senator Long amending 30:961(E) Renewed through 2016 the two-year life of the Surface Water Management program.

■ State Representative Jeff Thompson introduced HB 782 to amend the Surface Water Management Act of 2010, La. R.S. 30:961 et seq. adopted as Act 556 during the 2014 Regular Session

ACT 556 OF 2014

- "The state shall be reimbursed at fair market value for all use or withdrawal of running surface water from bodies of water managed by the Department of Wildlife and Fisheries and determined by the office of fisheries to be negatively impacted by invasive aquatic vegetation."
- "Fair market value as used in this Subsection shall be at a rate of not more than fifteen cents per thousand gallons, and shall not include the economic development, employment and increased tax revenues created by the activities associated with the withdrawal of running surface water."

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ACT 556 OF 2014

■The Act requires that payments for water withdrawn from designated lakes/rivers be made to the Aquatic Plant Control Fund (La. R.S. 56:10.1)

Additionally, this Act requires that funds generated by water withdrawals be used to combat invasive aquatic vegetation such as Water Hyacinth, Hydrillia and Giant Salvinia.

ACT 556 OF 2014

Limits the options for compensation to the state for water withdrawn from certain designated water bodies

Applies to water withdrawn from bodies of water negatively impacted by invasive aquatic vegetation as designated by the Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Office of Fisheries

■ The funds are preferably to be used on the body of water from which the revenues were generated.




- To enact its policies, the legislature set up various agencies with differing, but complementary, regulatory authority for water management.


2010 SURFACE WATER MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

- Applies to Surface Water Withdrawals and Uses
- Signatory Parties: DNR, DEQ and DWF
- Coordination with other resource agencies, as needed and as applicable.
- DNR charged with responsibility to facilitate coordination
